Rattlesnake Trail

LENGTH: 3.5 miles round trip to Tunnel Trail junction. 1000 feet

elevation gain. Moderate.

4.88 miles round trip to Gibraltar Road. 1550 feet

elevation gain. Moderately Strenuous.

TOPO MAP: Santa Barbara

ACCESS: From Santa Barbara Mission, drive 0.7 miles toward the mountains. At the first stop sign, turn right onto Foothill Road and drive 0.2 miles. Turn left onto Mission Canyon Road at the fire station, go 0.5 miles. Make a sharp uphill right turn onto Las Canoas Road. Drive 1.2 miles on this winding road and park on the right side shortly before the stone bridge. There is a large sign at the trailhead on the left side of the road. Total distance from Santa Barbara Mission is 2.6 miles.

DESCRIPTION: Rattlesnake Canyon is one of the area's most popular hikes. It is easily accessible and there is always water flowing in the creek.

After the first stream crossing and a short uphill climb the trail joins a fire road for a short distance. The road narrows once again to a trail and begins a gradual ascent with several stream crossings and a series of switchbacks. The lower portion is well shaded with California bay laurel, costal live oak and sycamore trees. In the spring it is a wildflower lover's paradise with most of the coastal range flowers in brilliant display of color.

As the trail gains altitude the views of the city, the ocean and the Channel Islands expand. About two-thirds of the way up there is a large meadow which ends near a junction with a connector to Tunnel Trail on the left and a continuation of the Rattlesnake Trail on the right. Before beginning the final portion of the trail we suggest a short rest on the huge boulders under the large oak tree marking this junction.

The last three-quarters of a mile is very steep and some of the trail had deep erosion gullies down the middle. The trail ends at Gibraltar Road where the view is excellent. However, watch for motor vehicle traffic at this point.

La Cumbre Peak via Tunnel Trail

LENGTH: 11.0 miles round trip. 3010 feet elevation gain.

Strenuous.

TOPO MAP: Santa Barbara

ACCESS: From Santa Barbara Mission drive 0.7 miles toward the mountains. At the first stop sign, turn right on Foot hill Rd., go 0.2 miles, then turn left on Mission Canyon Rd. at the firs station and continue for 1.0 miles. At the sign for Tunnel Rd., bear left and drive 1.2 miles to the end of the road. Parking is allowed on the right side of the road inside the white lines and not beyond the "No Parking" sign. Total distance from Santa Barbara Mission is 3.4 miles.

DESCRIPTION: Visible from the entire Santa Barbara area, La Cumbre Peak is the highest point of the front range of mountains. The white fire tower (no longer in use) is a landmark. From this point, with a view of the entire coastal land and sea area, hang gliders take off and soar gracefully over the lesser mountain ridges.

The stone covered face of Cathedral Peak lies directly in front of La Cumbre Peak. This peak is lower but more rugged and with only a primitive trail, it requires considerable rock-hopping to reach the summit

Fremont Trail

LENGTH: 7.62 miles round trip. 1680 feet elevation gain.

Strenuous.

TOPO MAP: Santa Barbara

ACCESS: From Santa Barbara Mission drive 0.7 miles toward the mountains. At the first stop sign, turn left on Foot hill Rd. Continue 3.0 miles to Highway 154. Turn right on 154 and drive 7.7 miles to East Camino Cielo. Continue on for 1.6 miles. Park beneath the tall Torrey Pine tree and walk to the locked gate at the trailhead. Total distance from Santa Barbara Mission is 13 miles.

DESCRIPTION: The Freemont trail is mostly a dirt road that mostly follows the historic path of John C. Fremont's battalion in 1846. The top half of the trail follows the original trail while the bottom half veers to the east into Paradise Canyon to avoid private property. As a dirt road that is still used and maintained, it is too exposed to be a pleasant hike in the summer time. Other times of year however, the trail afford spectacular views of Lake Cachuma, the Cold Springs bridge, the backcountry and even of the islands. Below there is a very pleasant meadow and a pretty seasonal stream. By anyone's measure, the trail is steep on the return. A tough workout for all.
